FROM THE COMPOSER

Steal a Pencil for Me had a very special inspiration: Jaap and Ina Polak, whom I had the honor to know for more than 25 years. The Polaks were active members of the synagogue where I am cantor in Scarsdale, NY. Jaap and Ina spent almost two years in concentration camps during World War II, and emigrated to the United States in 1951. Jaap spoke often and frankly to our community, as well as to civic groups and school children across the country, about his personal experience during the Holocaust, urging us not to discriminate, generalize, or be bystanders; and to work together to strengthen what is good in ourselves and in others.

My own parents fled Europe before war began. My mother left Germany at the age of 15 immediately after Kristallnacht; my father left Poland in 1935, but his mother and other relatives were killed by the Nazis. Jaap and Ina did not speak much about their war experiences until their daughter Margrit uncovered their love letters written during their incarceration; this opened a window to an intimate love story told against horrendous times. Their story gave us all the chance to learn first-hand that "epic horrors don't erase private dramas" (as stated in The New York Times review of the documentary film Steal a Pencil for Me), and that we can best find a way to respond emotionally to large and terrible historical events by experiencing the stories of imperfect people, in intimate and complicated personal situations, that happen in the throes of these events.

In 2010 I told Ina and Jaap that I was thinking of writing an opera based on their story, and after their initial surprise, Jaap told me, "Write it quickly!" He was 97 years old at the time, and Ina was 87. Both Jaap and Ina were deeply involved with the opera's creation, fleshing out personal details, including, "What were birthday parties like in Amsterdam during the occupation?" and, "What were the rollcalls like at Bergen-Belsen, and how were the prisoners lined up?" I am so grateful for the time we spent together talking about their lives.

There have been so many other people who have been involved in making this project a reality.

Thanks to Opera Colorado for its dedication to performing new opera, and for its enthusiasm and excellence in all the phases of creating this production—with special thanks to Greg Carpenter and Ari Pelto for their leadership, and Omer Ben Seadia for her inspiring direction.

In 2013, assisted by my congregation, Shaarei Tikvah, and by the Jewish Theological Seminary, we were able to workshop the opera in time for Jaap's 100th and Ina's 90th birthdays, and to have them present at the performances. The chance for the Polaks and the cast to meet each other, and for them to see the opera, was an unforgettable and moving experience for all. The wonderful cast included Ilana Davidson, Robert Balonek, Toby Newman, Nils Neubert, Cherry Duke, Ricardo Rivera, Matthew Singer, Miloslav Antonov, and Enrico Lagasca. The key artistic personnel were dramaturg Cori Ellison, conductor Ari Pelto, stage director Beth Greenberg, and vocal coach Lynn Baker.

There are four people that I would like to thank who have given me the courage to embark and stay the course on a project of this dimension. First, my wife Caroline, who says that challenges are opportunities—and means it. Cori Ellison, the inspiring dramaturg and expert of everything operatic, has been a central mentor for this project and my career as an opera composer; Cori knew exactly who would be the right collaborators and made those connections happen. One of the most fundamental was her introducing me to librettist Deborah Brevoort through our shared residencies at American Lyric Theater. Deborah has been a superb partner as we worked together to bring this real-life story to the stage; her great skills as a dramatist and storyteller, and her inspired and practical approach to the process, made it a pleasure to collaborate on creating this opera. Cori also introduced me to Ari Pelto, whom I first met in the 2013 workshop; Ari has championed the work and been a central part of its development since then, bringing it to this world premiere production.

The story of Ina and Jaap is a great and poignant one that has become an opera thanks to the generosity and commitment of all those above.

One last thought from Jaap: In his talks he always closed with, "Enjoy the simple things in life. We are living in a wonderful country and we all need to work together to make this a better worldbut this can only be achieved if people learn the lessons of the Holocaust."

FROM THE LIBRETTIST

The first thing that struck me about the letters that Jaap and Ina passed back and forth during their internment by the Nazis was how ordinary they were. There were occasional bursts of poetic sentiment, to be sure—they were love letters after all—but for the most part, their missives were quotidian, concerned with everyday matters and the need to simply keep up their spirits in order to survive. It was this ordinariness that was most moving-and oddly powerful-to me.

There is a tendency in stories like this to turn the characters into larger-than-life heroes and to make them somehow nobler or better than everyone else. But Jaap and Ina were neither heroic nor noble; they were utterly human, with flaws and foibles that all of us possess. They were ordinary people caught in an extraordinary situation; lacking any super human qualities beyond basic kindness and decency, they were nevertheless able to triumph. This is what makes their story so powerful and meaningful. It tells us that we, too-ordinary people all-possess the ability to survive and thrive when the tides of history turn against us.

Steal a Pencil for Me is an uplifting story about many things, most notably the enduring power of love and the imagination to help people survive horrors like the Holocaust. One of the things that stood out to me in this beautiful tale was how important stories were to Ina and Jaap's survival. Every day they would meet behind the barracks to imagine what their future life could be. Those imaginings formed a story that sustained them. It was a simple story-of ordinary breakfasts, and butter for the bread-but it nevertheless held great power and ultimately enabled them to survive. Steal a Pencil for Me shows us what is essential: love, stories with meaning and the utter necessity of the imagination, which, once it has envisioned something, then has the power to make that vision real.

SYNOPSIS STEAL A PENCIL FOR ME

CHARACTERS

Lisette – mezzo soprano
Manja Polak – mezzo soprano
Jaap Polak, Manja's husband - baritone

Act One - June 1943 to February 1944

In Nazi-occupied Amsterdam, friends and family gather to celebrate Lisette's birthday. Amongst the guests are Manja and Jaap Polak, unhappily married, but having agreed to stay together until the war ends. Jaap is immediately drawn to another party guest: Ina Soep, attending with her parents and her fiancé Rudi. Festivities are interrupted by a troop of Nazis who arrest several of the guests, including Rudi.

Manja, Jaap, his parents, and Lisette arrive at Holland's Westerbork Transit Camp. They are warned about so-called Tuesday Transports, at which time prisoners are regularly dispatched to crueler camps in the east. Ina and her parents also arrive, Ina fearful of the fate of Rudi, who has been delivered to another camp. Jaap advises her that imagining a better future is the only way to survive their present horror.

The Commandant announces that it is time for Tuesday Transport. Jaap's parents are amongst those selected, but Jaap manages to pocket the Commandant's pencil. He writes a love note to Ina, and Lisette passes it onward. She also brings back Ina's reply.

Word of the budding romance spreads. Manja, humiliated, insists

it must stop. Now the Commandant reads the list of names for the next Tuesday Transport: both Jaap and Manja are amongst those to be sent to Bergen-Belsen.

Act Two - May 1944 to June 1945

Ina, too, arrives at Bergen-Belsen. She and Jaap meet behind the barracks, dreaming of the simple joys they intend to share someday. Manja, and Ina's father Abraham, both declare the romance must end. Jaap and Ina agree, though they pledge to continue writing letters. Ina, who works in the Commandant's office, is asked to steal for Jaap another pencil. Hearing word of grim events at Auschwitz, she fears for the survival of Rudi.

On Passover, the guards are counting the prisoners. Ina slips off to steal a pencil for Jaap. Word comes that the camp is to be evacuated. As the prisoners are dispatched to other camps, Ina and Jaap find themselves heading in opposite directions. Seriously ill, he collapses unconscious.

Back in Amsterdam, everyone in the neighborhood searches for word of loved ones...

ABOUT STEAL A PENCIL FOR ME

In times of trouble, the greatest joys may come from the smallest experiences. Possessing a pencil or sharing a simple breakfast might not be noteworthy in everyday life. However, as Dutch Jews caught up in the Holocaust, Jaap and Ina were living lives far removed from the everyday variety. Nonetheless, it was real life for them and for millions of others, more real than one might be accustomed to finding in opera. It is one thing to talk about *verismo* opera, in which down-to-earth characters and believable occurrences are given musical form. It is entirely another when those characters are actual people personally known to the composer. Such is the world of Gerald Cohen's new opera *Steal a Pencil for Me*.

Jaap Polak and Ina Soep had only just met one another in Amsterdam in 1943 when they were separately arrested by the Germans and sent to concentration camps. The odds would have been strongly against them ending up at the same camp, but they did. Romance blossomed and both survived the war. Ultimately, they married and made their way to Scarsdale, New York, where they joined the congregation of the Shaarei Tikvah synagogue. In later years, Cohen became the synagogue's cantor. Coming to know them and their story, and imagining what a powerful opera could be made of those real-life events, he set to work on an opera – with the Polaks' full approval.

Cohen and his librettist Deborah Brevoort met frequently with the Polaks to hear their stories anew and browse letters written with those stolen pencils of long ago: just because the pencils are in the Commandant's office does not mean one might not manage to procure one for one's own use. Gradually, a singable tale took shape around the basic facts, and in 2013, an initial version of *Steal a Pencil for Me* was performed in New York with the Polaks in the audience.

The opera's existence came to the attention of Opera Colorado, which expressed a strong interest in giving the premiere of a final version of the work—once it was fully ready for the public. After looking over the opera in its embryonic form, Opera Colorado General Director Greg Carpenter and Music Director Ari Pelto began suggesting ways in which it could be made bigger and better. Details of the story were re-arranged for more effective dramatic flow; scenes were designed to allow more insight into personalities. Furthermore, secondary characters were expanded so as to make more of the tale than just "boy meets girl – boy loses girl – boy gets girl back." Admittedly, that tiny nutshell summary suggests the basic shape of many operas, most prominently including La Bohéme, but most stage works benefit from having more than just two voices. In its final form, Steal a Pencil for Me becomes a true ensemble piece, and ultimately a life-affirming tale.

A Holocaust story with a happy ending? Indeed, Jaap and Ina genuinely did enjoy another half century of life and love together, allowing the opera to be far more than just a sequence of grim

THE ARTISTS



GERALD COHEN | Composer

Gerald Cohen has been praised for his "linguistic fluidity and melodic gift," creating music that "reveals a very personal modernism that...offers great emotional rewards" (Gramophone). His affecting compositions been recognized with numerous awards and critical accolades. The music on his recently released CD, Sea of Reeds, "is

filled with vibrant melody, rhythmic clarity, drive and compositional construction...a sheer delight to hear" (Gapplegate Music Review). Cohen is a noted synagogue cantor and baritone; his experience as a singer informs his dramatic, lyrical compositions. Cohen's bestknown work, his "shimmering setting" (Pittsburgh Post-Gazette) of Psalm 23, has received thousands of performances from synagogues and churches to Carnegie Hall and the Vatican. Recent instrumental compositions include Voyagers, a celebration of the 40th anniversary of the Voyager spacecraft, which had its premiere at New York's Hayden Planetarium; and Playing for our lives, a tribute to the music and musicians of the WWII Terezin concentration camp near Prague. Recognition of Cohen's body of work includes the Copland House Borromeo String Quartet Award and Hoff-Barthelson/Copland House commission, Westchester Prize for New Work, American Composers Forum Faith Partners and American Lyric Theater residencies, and commissioning grants from Meet the Composer, National Endowment for the Arts, New York State Council on the Arts, and Westchester Arts Council. Cohen received a BA in music from Yale University and a DMA in composition from Columbia University. He is cantor at Shaarei Tikvah, Scarsdale, NY, and is on the faculties of The Jewish Theological Seminary and Hebrew Union College. www.geraldcohenmusic.com



DEBORAH BREVOORT | Librettist

Deborah Brevoort is an award-winning playwright and librettist from Alaska who started writing for the opera after participating in American Lyric Theater's Composer Librettist Development program. She is best known for her play The Women of Lockerbie, which is performed throughout the United States and internationally. Her opera librettos include Embedded with

composer Patrick Soluri, which premiered at Fargo Moorhead and Ft. Worth Operas and new adaptations of Mozart's Impresario and Johann Strauss's Die Fledermaus for the Anchorage Opera. She is currently writing Albert Nobbs, with Patrick Soluri, which was a finalist for the 2018 Pellicciotti Prize in Opera Composition; selections were presented earlier this month in the New Works Forum at Opera America. A two-time winner of the Frederick Loewe award in musical theatre for Coyote Goes Salmon Fishing (composer Scott Richards) and King Island Christmas (composer David Friedman), Brevoort also wrote the book and lyrics for Crossing Over, an Amish Hip Hop musical with composer/lyricist Stephanie Salzman that will be presented at NYC's Theatre Barn and York Theatre in 2018. Blue Moon Over Memphis, her Noh Drama about Elvis, is touring internationally in a traditional Noh production by Theatre Nohgaku. Her plays, which have been produced at theatres around the US, include The Poetry of Pizza, The Blue-Sky Boys, The Comfort Team and My Lord, What a Night. Brevoort teaches

in NYU's Graduate Musical Theatre writing program, and the MFA dramatic writing programs at Columbia University and Goddard College. Her plays are published by Dramatists Play Service, Samuel French, Applause Books and No Passport Press, www.deborahbrevoort.com



KATHERINE BECK *^ | Lisette

Katherine Beck, originally from Bennington. VT, received her MM in Vocal Arts at USC Thornton and her BM in Vocal Performance at the Crane School of Music in upstate New York. Last June, Beck made her debut at Symphony Hall with the Boston Pops Orchestra in the World Premiere of James Lapine's Sondheim on Sondheim. She spent the remainder of the summer

in Lenox, MA, as a Vocal Fellow at the Tanglewood Music Center. Following Tanglewood, she returned to Los Angeles to perform the role of Mercedes in Carmen. Favorite opera credits include the title role in Berlioz's Béatrice et Bénédict and Sesto in Mozart's La clemenza di Tito, both at USC Thornton. Beck also sang Sesto in Handel's Giulio Cesare in Egitto with Pittsburgh Festival Opera in 2016. She is thrilled to be a member of Opera Colorado's Young Artist Program. This season she will sing the role of Angelina in the touring production of Cinderella as well the role of Meg Page, which she will cover in the mainstage production and sing in the Student Matinee of Falstaff.



assemblies for Roll Call at Bergen-Belsen. We meet Jaap and Ina and their friends and family at a party before their arrests, giving us familiarity with the participants before their lives are turned upsidedown. Moreover, that opening scene sets up the potential for a complementary quartet later in the opera, when the two sweethearts, along with Jaap's then-wife Manja and the ghost of Ina's late fiancé Rudi raise their voices together, with plenty of tender woodwinds to add richness. The musical colors allow us to feel their fears, but also their joys, as Manja and Rudi, rather than left sadly behind, give their blessing to the new couple. It is not a case of winners vs. losers; it is life going forward.

As for the libretto, with most operas, librettists have a certain amount of leeway in word selection, as long as the phrases are singable and suit the composer's vision of the tale. Yet in this case, the characters are based upon real people and real events, and librettist Brevoort has observed that she found it uplifting to "actually spend time with them." Those experiences led her to craft her text in a fashion that would reflect the actual persons whose experiences were being evoked. So Ina, youngest of the four principal characters, tends to be given less assertive phrases: ingénues simply don't speak out as firmly as college professors. Manja, on the other hand, is already growing apart from her husband

Jaap even before Ina arrives on the scene, and generally expresses herself in more restless statements, indicative, one imagines, of her discontent. Set such differences to music, and the contrast of personalities becomes even clearer, yet the words may be the root of the matter. After all, music expresses feelings, but words carry more specific meaning.

A regrettably small percentage of modern operas find a lasting place in the repertoire. Some contain music that may be hard to embrace; others have characters that fail to entirely reach the listeners' hearts. Steal a Pencil for Me is too new for one to be really sure of its future. However, that it is a focused tale revolving around a small set of persons caught up in events that, whether or not they happened the better part of a century ago, yet hold a firm place in the public eye, may help the opera to succeed in the long run. Certainly, its affecting music and compelling text should smooth the path to success. Opera Colorado audiences can revel in the satisfaction of having been with the opera from near its beginning.
